Our link with junior school KJA in Kilifi, Kenya, has grown dramatically over the last couple of years. In 2020 our school community was able to raise enough money to install and supply electricity to the school. This allowed the school to install lights in classrooms and connect the school to WiFi. Students from the school were able to access the internet for the first time to watch videos on Volcanic eruptions and read short stories from around the world.

Students from St Mary's College have been writing letters to students of KJA learning about each other's education and normal day-to-day life. Last year with numerous fundraising events including the Hull 10k, Sports Day and Culture Day, as a community we were able to smash our £2500 target and raise £4000 to develop the physical school site further and build three new classrooms. KJA will now continue to grow and have its very own Junior Secondary school to allow older students to extend their education further. A huge thank you to everyone who has donated and continues to support the growth of our partner school.

Art Project



This month we had the privilege of welcoming abstract artist Annie Luke Turner into school. Annie came into work on a project with our Year 8 Core Group and our EAL form group. The students loved the opportunity to explore their own heritage through art.


In the weeks leading up to the project the students were asked to start exploring their own identity and for those who it applied to, their dual heritage. The artwork was centered on landmarks; students were asked to research a landmark from their country of heritage and one from Hull. This project focused on a celebration of culture and positively highlighted diversity in the classroom.

Students began by tracing landmarks into silver card. Once the outline was in place, students had to scratch into the card using etching tools leaving deep grooves in the card in the shape of their chosen landmark. Then ink was pushed into the card and wiped off (no easy task!) leaving just the outline filled with ink. The card was then run through a printing press, leaving unique and beautiful prints.

The outcome of the day was touching – the table was filled with landmarks from across the globe that meant a great deal to the students who had chosen them. The students were proud of the art and proud to see their heritage displayed. Students always welcome a reason to show others who they are and what matters to them; this was a wonderful opportunity for them to do that.











UK Maths Challenge success

We've just heard of some superb results from our post-16 Maths students at the United Kingdom Mathematics Trust challenge, a fantastic achievement! It is clear that they have worked hard to prepare for these tests. The UKMT is aimed at the most talented mathematicians in schools with only the top 66% receiving a certificate. Bronze, silver and gold certificates are allocated in a ratio of 3:2:1, meaning that only the top 11% of students achieve a Gold. An entry into the British Mathematical Olympiad Round 1 also incredibly prestigious and a huge achievement. Each year, roughly 1000 students are invited to take part. Lora is only two steps away from representing the UK at competitions such as the International Mathematical Olympiad.

Poetry is an integral part of teaching and learning in the English curriculum, so we thought we would share one of the poems that Year 10 have been studying recently.

Vernon Scannell was born under the name John Vernon Bain and enlisted in the British army in 1940, at the age of 18. He changed his name after deserting the army — though he was arrested and sentenced despite this. His desertion came from his personal distaste for the war, and his belief that there was nothing inside of him that was fit for a soldier's life.

After the war, he settled down to work on writing as his primary focus.

My son aged three fell in the nettle bed. 'Bed' seemed a curious name for those green spears,

That regiment of spite behind the shed:
It was no place for rest. With sobs and tears
The boy came seeking comfort and I saw
